
Many Working Minds:

Wiki—is from the Hawaiian word wiki or kiwiki, which means fast or speedy.

Howard G. "Ward" Cunningham created wiki in 1994 with WikiWikiWeb.

He wanted "the simplest online database that could possibly work."



Bol Leuf said of wiki, "Wiki is inherently democratic
—every user has exactly
the same capabilities as any other user."

That statement raises all sorts of potential problems from posting erroneous material or other unfair practices.


So why does the democratic experiment work?

Sunstein think that it has not been misused, because everyone wants Cunningham's democratic experiment to function well.



Wikipedia's mission is "to distribute a free encyclopedia to every single person on the planet in their own language."




# There are nearly 4 million English articles on wiki... as of 3/10/12.

De vrije encyclopedie 668 000+ artikelen Sunstein said of wiki, "...it dwarfs the *Encyclopedia Britannica*."

His point was in volume/size, but some of the articles are not perfect with important omissions and errors.

Nevertheless, volunteers attempt to correct the problems quickly with hundreds of revisions on an hourly basis. Sunstein discusses the concept that in wiki that authorship is corporate.
Articles are started, edited, reedited, etc.

That also allows for copying data and using it without legal issues.



GNU Free Documentation License is used by wiki.

Sunstein raises the issue of impartiality of various authors on hot-button issues.

Wiki attempts to alert the readers to this problem with this Stop Hand.



# Why Wikis Work (or Not)

Should the ones that do most of the editing receive a franchise and a "more powerful status?"

Then what would stop someone from getting to that status and then mess with the message and have control over differing points of view?

## Wikis and More Wikis

Other media outlets have experimented with the wiki model with varying degrees of success.

The Los Angeles Times attempt failed and Esquire's succeeded.

There is a large range of new types of wikis.
The range from Wikicities, to World Wind Wiki,
to Wikispecies, to Wikisource, to Meta-Wiki,
to Flu Wiki, to Urban Dictionary, etc.

I looked up dime in the Urban Dictionary.


What does it mean?

On a number of occasions blogger found things that affected the general populace.


- 1. Rather-gate and memos about Bush

- 3. John Kerry remembered Christmas in Cambodia


# Not Hayek: Problems in the Blogosphere

Blogs lack peer review. There is also a lack of monetary interest for either good or bad blogging.

Sunstein discusses another problem with blogs; they tend to be read by people who agree with the blogger. Conservatives do not generally read liberal bloggers and vice versa.

### Sunstein calls blogs the echo chamber effect.

### **Evidence**

Sunstein cites some early research that finds "91% of he links are to like-minded sites."

He calls this the cocoon effect and is similar to the echo chamber effect.

Finally, Sunstein addresses the aggregate dispersed information issue.

www.slashdot.org News for nerds, stuff that matters.... This is a site for engaging discussion. It has a grading device for their viewers to record their rating.

# Angies list.

www.angieslist.com does the same thing that was started years before by the Better Business Bureau.



www.eBay.com also does a similar evaluation with messages describing their rating on a product.

Open source software also has a possible even brighter future.
